<u>Feral</u> children are children who have grown up with minimal human contact, or even none at all. They may have been raised by animals (often wolves) or somehow survived on their own. Perhaps the best-known story of feral children is that of the two girls, Kamala and Amala, who were raised by a she-wolf. In 1920, the scientist J. A. L. Singh saw a mother wolf and her cubs, two of which looked like human. After considerable preparation and difficulties, the two human creatures were finally captured. They turned out to be two girls whose ages were measured around 8 years and 10 months respectively.

Without any exposure to human language, these girls could not speak. Besides, the scientist also observed that they always walked on all fours, licked all liquids with their tongues, and ate their food in a crouched position. Their tongues permanently hung out of their thick, red lips. They slept during the day and walked at night. They even bit and attacked others if they felt threatened. Their hearing was very acute and they could smell meat at a great distance. Unfortunately, in September 1921, Amala, the younger, died. Kamala lived for nine years in an orphanage, gradually losing her animal nature until she died of illness.
